

Who is Eligible?



March 15th, 2021 Vaccine Distribution Guidance

- Beginning March 15, healthcare providers may use their clinical judgement to vaccinate individuals age 16-64 who are deemed to be at the very highest risk for morbidity and mortality from COVID-19 as a direct result of one or more of the following severe health conditions:
 - Cancer, current with debilitated or immunocompromised state
 - Chronic kidney disease, stage 4 or above
 - Chronic pulmonary disease, oxygen dependent
 - Down syndrome
 - Immunocompromised state (weakened immune system) from solid organ transplant
 - Pregnancy
 - Sickle cell disease
 - Heart conditions, such as heart failure, coronary artery disease, or cardiomyopathies (excludes hypertension)
 - Severe obesity (Body Mass Index ≥ 40 kg/m2)
 - Type 2 diabetes mellitus with hemoglobin A1c level greater than 7.5%

OR

- If as a result of a developmental or other severe high-risk disability one or more of the following applies:
 - The individual is likely to develop severe life-threatening illness or death from COVID-19 infection
 - Acquiring COVID-19 will limit the individual's ability to receive ongoing care or services vital to their well-being and survival
 - Providing adequate and timely COVID care will be particularly challenging as a result of the individual's disability



People who are eligible to be vaccinated should contact their healthcare provider for more information or to make an appointment.



Frequently Asked Questions

- All vaccine sites are accessible for mobility and sensory impaired—All ADA accessible
 - Notify the vaccine schedulers at appointment center of special needs and accommodations will be made. Expect to be placed on a wait list
 - West County: Richmond Auditorium is preferred site for mobility impaired
- Transportation may be a barrier, let schedulers know and they may be able to provide solutions
- Early arrivals will not be seen early. If you need to arrive early, expect a wait.
- The vaccines do not affect fertility or child bearing capacity.
- Vaccines do not contain live virus, do not make you ill or contagious with COVID 19
- NO CHIPS in any vaccine
- Masks will still be necessary
